15. Approve Amendment 6, to IGA# HG854323, STD Services, between the Arizona Department of Health Services and the Cochise County Health Department, in the amount of \$2,271, for the period of 1/1/11 to 12/31/11.

16. Approve the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between Cochise County and Pearce-Sunsites Fire District allowing the District to locate a repeater station at Cooper Peak, in exchange for several services from the District that will be made available to Cochise County law enforcement and emergency response personnel.

Motion by Vice-Chairman English, to approve the Consent Agenda, Items 1-17;
Second by Supervisor Searle and approved 3-0.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Community Development

18. Adopt Zoning Ordinance 11-02 (Docket Z-11-01), conditionally amending the Zoning District classification for Parcel 206-21-194B from SR-43 (Single-Household Residential, minimum lot size one-acre) to RU-4 (Rural, minimum lot size four-acres), with the two conditions recommended in the staff memorandum.

Motion by Supervisor Searle to adopt Zoning Ordinance 11-02 (Docket Z-11-01), conditionally amending the Zoning District classification for Parcel 206-21-194B from SR-43 (Single-Household Residential, minimum lot size one-acre) to RU-4 (Rural, minimum lot size four-acres), with the two conditions recommended in the staff memorandum. The motion was seconded by Vice-Chairman English.

Mr. Keith Dennis, Senior Planner presented this item and detailed the two conditions recommended by staff as outlined in the Executive Summary. He explained that the Teply zoning request was to combine their two parcels and downzone from SR43 to RU4 to allow construction of an accessory building larger than the primary residence. RU4 would also allow them to construct the shop prior to building their home; this is not allowed in SR43 zoned properties. He showed a location map off of Hwy 191 on Cochise Stronghold Road and showed views of the undeveloped property. Mr. Dennis then reviewed the status of this request's compliance with the 15 rezoning factors—adding that all conditions are either complied with or do not apply. He told the Board that Planning & Zoning had received one letter of support from a neighbor to the South. He then reviewed the factors in favor and said there were no apparent factors against approval. Mr. Dennis added that on March 9, 2011, the Planning & Zoning Commission voted unanimously to approve the request.

Supervisor Searle commented that this property should have been RU4 to begin with.

Chairman Call opened the public hearing. No one wished to address the Board and he closed the public hearing and called for a vote.

The motion was approved, 3-0.

19. Approve Docket SUA-11-01 (Douglas), an appeal of the Planning Commission's February 9, 2011 approval of Docket SU-11-01 (Ballator).

Mr. Keith Dennis, Senior Planner, presented this item also. He explained that this was an appeal of the Planning & Zoning Commission's unanimous approval of Docket SU-11-01 on February 9, 2011 which legitimized an existing bird watching exhibit in Ash Canyon which is associated with an existing bed and breakfast operation. The appellant seeks to overturn the PZC's approval with this appeal the Board of Supervisors. He said the appeal is a review of the appropriateness of the operation from both a regulatory and policy standpoint.

Mr. Dennis provided a history of the bird watching use at the site, showed a project site plan, location map and aerial photos of the site. He explained that the orange highlighted road is Turkey Track and showed the subject area of the Special Use Permit (SUP). He stated that the SUP requires the applicant to maintain the road condition of this segment. He then showed a closer aerial view of the subject property. During an interim period of review of the SUP, the applicant had made arrangements to have people park vehicles on adjacent property. The SUP, he explained, requires parking on the Ballator property. Mr. Dennis showed photos of the various segments of the property and of the parking area.

Nature of the appeal: This private easement is used for commercial access (deed restrictions do exist, but the applicant did not provide those when SUP was originally submitted). Very major concern from neighbors: the appeal, Mr. Dennis reported, is signed by 13 property owners in the area. Spring Road is wide enough for emergency vehicle traffic but concern is turnaround space. There is also concern regarding wildlife feeding and welfare and also about maintaining the rural residential neighborhood character.

The County mailed out letters to all residents within 1500' of the subject property. Mr. Dennis showed a map of support (5 neighbors) and protest (13 support the

appeal). He then reviewed the factors in favor of granting the appeal and those in favor of overturning the PZC decision. He explained that larger passenger buses and RVs have also visited the site along the narrow Spring Road travelway.

Staff recommendation was that before the applicant gets a permit, she was to work with the County Transportation Planner to ensure adequate parking and space for turnaround, compliant with Americans with Disabilities Act . The site plan would have to be revised. Instead, at the PZC, some site work was done on the property prior to the applicant turning in the application. He pointed out that the birding workshops have continued on the property.

The PZC voted 7-0 to conditionally approve the SUP. With the recommended condition, the birding operation would comply with each of the eight applicable SU evaluation factors.

Mr. Dennis added that the business is considered to be relatively low-impact and there were no complaints about the road condition or business from 2002 until the Special Use application.

The PZC conditions state that any change to the business requires a new public input process. There is also a private maintenance agreement in place for Spring Road. Mr. Dennis says they have letters from 5 neighbors in support, as well as hundreds of letters from people across the country associated with birding activities and a few letters from local business owners.

Britt Hanson, Chief Civil Deputy County Attorney, stated that he thought it would be useful to clarify that BOS' decisions are based on land use and Zoning Regulations, and not on private easements, etc. and read a caveat from the Zoning Regulations. If the parties wish to take the legal argument regarding whether use of easement is allowed or denied, he said, that is for the courts to decide.

Ms. Karen Lamberton then addressed the SUP from a traffic analysis perspective looking at the average daily traffic and annual, both off-season and peak season traffic (April – June). Off season traffic is approximately 16 per day which is just slightly higher than the residential average; 107 trips without the Ballator use. With Ballator use, she said, it would be another 7 vehicles per day which can average between an additional 4-21 trips per day. From a traffic impact standpoint, it is not as great a concern; however large buses and vans, with groups visiting, have raised concerns regarding the Special Use. She reported that when they visited the site, there were a number of issues related to internal circulation from a pedestrian standpoint and off-site impacts, due to how the

parking lot was oriented, etc. The intent was to work with her to resolve issues through the commercial permit process. The commercial permit requires more scrutiny, due diligence. Will take 12 months to get commercial permit and will have time to work issues out with her.

She stated that last year, the Ballator site brought out about 3,000 individuals last season; if all had come out in individual cars, would have been 88 individuals per day, but many trips were in buses or large vans with groups.

Supervisor Searle asked what the PZC rationale was on their vote? Mr. Dennis stated that they went along with staff's recommendation. He added that the total position of support/protest has changed since the PZC hearing.

Ms. Mary Jo Ballator then addressed the Board saying that she is the sole operator and owner of Ash Canyon Bed & Breakfast. Since 2002 she has allowed birders into her home to view birds. Activities are important to birds. The birders bring a lot of revenue to the County. Her home, she said, is a recreational field trip site for schools and senior centers. She has received incredible support from birders, individually and organizations, biologists etc. supporting her efforts. Because her means of survival is at risk here she feels it necessary to respond to objectors.

Since opening in 2002, she said, the frustration from people is frustration typical of those who live along a primitive county road. She said she has never had a complaint in the nine years since she opened the B&B and birding operation, and no requests for maintenance. No requests for speed limit signs or speed control devices. Her customers have not stirred up dust, unlike the garbage trucks that visit twice weekly. None of her neighbors except Mr. Douglas have come to her home to see her operation. Using her property for purposes that are allowed in RU4 zoning. She is open every day from first light to last light. She never has any idea how many customers she will have in a given day. She added that she has 6.4 acres and that there are several property owners along Spring Road. She asked that the PZC decision be upheld.

Explained that there was permission for the visitors to park on the Peterson's property previously. She said then that she only had two spaces available; she has now expanded parking on her own property and that she had to clear trees and rocks to make room for parking.

She added that she has worked with the County Transportation Planner and that she has a total of 7 parking spaces; 4 on the west side, 2 on east side and one alongside of her garage. When Ms. Lamberton was there, I thought that what she was telling was the plan. Needed to create those spaces quickly because

the birds were coming. She pointed out that there were no state or federal requirement to have restrooms; that condition was waived for me by the PZC.

Mr. Art Douglas, appellant, stated that this is a protest about the residents and their right to live in peace; it is a protest to the PZC's opening Turkey Track to a commercial enterprise. He showed a view of site in question, including the neighbors' homes. He displayed an aerial photo that shows the parking area that gradually developed on the Peterson property which has become sizeable. He pointed out that the signatures on Ms. Ballator's guest register would not include those who did not sign in. He stated that there is a private easement along Spring Road which is to grant property owners along the road the right of ingress and easement to access their properties. He said the applicant put up a large berm initially; that had to be removed but it took her two weeks to do so. When the parking lot was extended it encroached on the right-of-way. He asked several questions regarding whether the parking area is sufficient and stated that the informal parking area is two times larger than the current upgraded parking area on the Ballator property. The road is narrow, he said, and showed photos. There is no room to pass; he explained that you have to wait for traffic before proceeding. Dust is also a major concern for homeowners; he showed photos to illustrate this. He added that U.S. taxpayers and private conservancy groups are providing unique bird watching in Southeast Arizona, with over 4,000 acres dedicated to that use. Is it an appropriate use for a home site of 6+ acres?

He also asked whether there should be a policy on expected impacts before a special use permit is issued (relative to wildlife management). On the Ash Canyon B&B website he said it states that visitors can go on other parts of the property. At the PZC meeting, however, Mr. Dennis told commissioners that this was going to be a controlled public setting in a small portion of the yard. The property, Mr. Douglas pointed out, is taxed on a residential basis. The PZC also struck down the requirement for restrooms (which was recommended by staff); based on traffic, shouldn't there be restrooms? He provided a summary of legal counsel's opinion regarding the public use of a private easement and pointed out that in 2008, he had to grant private easement rights to water and electric companies to access properties.

Supervisor Searle confirmed that all the properties along Spring Road have the same deed restrictions as Mr. Douglas' deed? Mr. Douglas confirmed.

Chairman Call opened the public hearing and numerous people addressed the Board regarding this matter:

No one else wished to address the Board in the public hearing and Chairman Call closed the public hearing.

The Board discussed the matter. Vice-Chairman English stated that this no longer seems like a low-key operation and that she thinks a transportation needs to be in place. She added that she thinks that with that many people visiting, the County should require sanitation facilities.

Chairman Call stated that he had been out there many times talking to the parties and that the issue is the traffic on the road. It has increased dramatically. He said he didn't think it was fair to the neighbors and that he had asked about a compromise but folks seem to be entrenched. He observed that it is always best to try and work these matters out among the neighbors. He said he would support the appeal to deny the permit, based on the rights of the residential area. We are talking about a lot of strangers coming into a residential area, he said.

Supervisor Searle stated that he came into this meeting leaning in support of Ms. Ballator and added that the County does not get involved in deed restrictions.

However, the easement is for residential use. He said he supports private property rights but the deed suggests that the easement is only for residential use. He added that this is not a pro-bird issue.

Britt Hanson stated that if Ms. Ballator is advertising that people can come to visit for birds, visitors to her home can't be regulated by zoning regulations, but that it could result in possible litigation. He advised the Board that they need to be clear about their action today.

Supervisor Searle asked Mr. Dennis if Ms. Ballator had the same language on her deed as Mr. Douglas. Mr. Dennis stated that he sent a request to the County's right-of-way agent and then checked with the Recorder's office; the restrictions appear to be the same as Mr. Douglas' deed restrictions.

Vice-Chairman English made a motion to approve Docket SUA-11-01 (Douglas), an appeal of the Planning Commission's February 9, 2011 approval of Docket SU-11-01 (Ballator). Supervisor Searle seconded the motion.

Supervisor Searle stated that he supports what Ms. Ballator is doing; it's an amazing thing. However, the language on the deed is what drives my decision, he said.—he will support the appeal.

Chairman Call agreed with Supervisor Searle's comments; he will support the appeal because of the residents' rights to privacy and this being a somewhat impactful use.

He called for the vote and the motion carried 2 (to support appeal) and 1 to deny (English). The appeal passes.

Chairman Call recessed the Board meeting at 1:30 pm.

Chairman Call reconvened the Board meeting at 2:31 p.m. He announced that Supervisor Searle was absent as he is attending another meeting at this time.

Community Development

20. Approve an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the City of Tombstone and the County of Cochise for setback inspections from the Tombstone Aqueduct.

Vice-Chairman English moved to approve an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the City of Tombstone and the County of Cochise for setback

inspections from the Tombstone Aqueduct. Chairman Call seconded the motion.

Mr. Rick Corley, Zoning Administrator is to perform setback inspections on the Tombstone Aqueduct which was constructed in 1880 to transfer water from the Miller Canyon area to a reservoir near the City of Tombstone, to provide water for the City. The pipeline is approximately 24 miles. Tombstone is requesting services from the County as outlined in the IGA. The fee for the IGA was determined by using P&Z fee schedule for inspection fees, at a rate of \$15 per hour. Following brief discussion about marking the aqueduct via GIS systems and steps to protect the pipeline, Chairman Call called for the vote and the motion was approved 2-0-1 (Searle absent).

21. Adopt Resolution 11-13 to approve the amendments to the Fiscal Year 2010-2011 Highway Users Revenue Fund (HURF) Annual Work Plan.

Vice-Chairman English moved to remove item 21 from the agenda, Chairman Call seconded and called for the vote:

The motion was approved 2-0-1 (Searle absent).

Human Resources

22. Approve the Cochise Combined Trust schedule of benefits and rates for Fiscal Year 2011-2012.

Vice-Chairman English made a motion to approve the Cochise Combined Trust schedule of benefits and rates for Fiscal Year 2011-2012. Chairman Call seconded the motion.

Mike Ortega summarized the item saying there was a change in benefit and in costs and stated that there are no changes since he presented to the Board a few days ago. He stated that the Cochise Combined Trust (CCT) reserves will cover those costs. He presented information outlining a summary of medical changes to the plan and why those changes were made; he also advised of changes due to health care reform, which are required by the federal government. He discussed the fiscal impact of each of these changes and told the Board the CCT is trying to add schools or cities who are interested in the CCT. The new plan changes will go into effect July 1.

The motion was approved, 2-0-1 (Searle absent).

STATE & FEDERAL LEGISLATION

23. Discussion and possible action regarding the status of the Arizona state budget including discussion of the County Supervisors Association-produced document entitled "County Impacts in the Final Budget Plan", and legislative bills listed on the attached Legislative Policy Committee meeting agenda.

Mr. Ortega discussed legislation that was introduced by us to increase the jail cost credit for prison time was passed by the House. He added that Senator Griffin was instrumental in its passage. He then reviewed the status of other bills, including those with an impact on the contributions to the retirement systems.
